



Annual Water Quality Consumer Confidence Report

The City of Boulder City believes it is essential to provide all the facts about Southern Nevada's drinking water to our customers. The Water Quality Consumer Confidence Report, which is issued annually, includes test results, a source water analysis, an overview of the treatment process and other valuable information relating to the quality of our municipal water supply. The 2023 Report is published in accordance with the federal Safe Drinking Water Act, which establishes drinking water standards and requires purveyors to provide water quality information to their customers.



The sources of drinking water include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals, and in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity. This water may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. To ensure tap water is safe to drink, the EPA prescribes regulations which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons should seek advice from their healthcare providers about drinking water.

In 2022, 13 regulated contaminants were detected in Boulder City's drinking water. However, these contaminants were all at allowable levels based on the Safe Drinking Water Act standards and no health violations were reported. Additionally, 3 unregulated contaminants were detected. Unregulated contaminant monitoring helps the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) determine where certain contaminants occur and whether these contaminants should be regulated in the future.

Some customers choose to purchase water filtration devices to improve the aesthetics of their home drinking water. All home water treatment devices require periodic maintenance. The majority of water quality complaints received by the City are due to private equipment and private plumbing.
